Albert John Kubeluis, Jr., 81

The former Bowie resident, passed away on February 25, 2024, at his home in McDaniel, Maryland surrounded by family.

Al was born on April 18, 1942, to Albert and Anna (Buda) Kubeluis. He is survived by his wife Mary Jo (Steenbergen), daughter Adrienne (son-in-law Andrew Schmutge, grandchildren Julian and Laney, both college students in Virginia), son Chris (daughter-in-law Nichole, granddaughter Dr. Rowan Kubeluis, DDS), sister Carol Libonati, nieces Genevieve, Rachel and Stephanie, his honorary grandchildren, Samantha and Ian Cavanaugh and Cate Hogan and an extended family he held dear.

Al's grandparents immigrated from Lithuania during World War I and he grew up in a Lithuanian neighborhood on Washington Avenue in Baltimore City where Orioles Park now stands. Although they never learned English, one grandmother built a thriving business and his grandfather and father worked for the B&O Railroad. He was a second-generation American who grew up in a multigenerational household that included his grandparents and beloved Uncle Eddie Buda. Al spent much of his formative years at the family's summer home on Bodkin Creek in Pasadena, where he learned to swim, water ski, and explore the local waterways. He developed a lifelong passion for the Chesapeake and its tributaries. He attended St. Jerome's grade school

and then Baltimore Polytechnic Institute. It was there that he found success in school and on the swim team. Al attended Loyola University Maryland as a recipient of its first swimming scholarship. He also earned a master's degree from the School of Government and Public Administration at American University in Washington, DC.

Al met his wife, Mary Jo Steenberg of Beavercreek, Ohio, during his college years, while lifeguarding at Johns Hopkins Hospital pool where she was a nursing student. They were married in 1964 and had two children, Adrienne Kubeluis of Wintergreen, Virginia (formerly from Baltimore, Maryland) and Christopher Kubeluis of Gaithersburg, Maryland.

Al started his professional career in computer science at the National Security Administration while concurrently earning his master's degree. He then devoted 28 years working for the Federal Reserve Board (FRB) managing the Data Administration Division while raising his family in Bowie. During his tenure at the FRB, he received Commendation from Chairman Alan Greenspan and was appointed to the Presidential Executive Exchange Program by President Ronald Reagan where he worked in a one-year liaison position in the private sector for Johnson and Johnson, in Brunswick, New Jersey. He also received a special achievement award from Chairman Paul Volker in 1986. During these work years, Al enjoyed sharing his love of sports and athletics with his children, friends and co-workers.

Al retired from the Federal Reserve in 1997 and he and Mary Jo built a home on Harris Creek in McDaniel, Maryland near St. Michael's. He was a member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary, Creek Watchers, and volunteer swim instructor. He volunteered at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum and loved to boat, kayak, crab, fish, and enjoy the water with his extended family and friends. Known as Pop by his grandchildren and family, Al cites his greatest accomplishment as his family.

Al was an avid, lifelong endurance athlete. In addition to setting swim records at Baltimore Polytech and Loyola University, Al won the 4.4 mile Chesapeake Bay Bridge swim race held in 1962 (Baltimore Sun July 12, 1962) while still in college. He ran with the Federal Reserve Striders and in more than 50 marathons, 50-mile and 100-mile ultra-marathons. He was a triathlete before the sport gained widespread popularity. He also enjoyed mountain and road biking, whitewater and flat water kayaking, yoga, and Masters swimming. Always competitive, Al raced internationally on his stationary rowing machine across the internet.

“ Thoughts and Remembrances of Al Kubeluis

It was in early in the 1970s that I first met Al. The Pointer Ridge section of Bowie was a new suburban development; so everyone was new to the community. That reality framed to social climate for all of us. We, as parents, were young; and, we had young children, many of whom became playmates and classmates when they went to school. A number of them became friends, even lifelong friends as is the case in our families. To this day we consider them part of our family.

Al was, to say it briefly, a complex person. He was smart and accomplished in many diverse arenas. When he pursued a task or engaged in a diverse array of sporting activities, he gave it all he had.

He didn't just run; he ran marathons. Riding bikes became a passion; and he kept upgrading his equipment, acquiring a depth of knowledge about the latest features of what was available.

In the late 1990s, I got to see and experience “the best of Al”. Along came his granddaughter

Rowan. Fortuitously Al was able to retire from his working career. In retirement he became available to focus his attention on her. Observing Al in that caring relationship was heartwarming and revelatory.

One of the realities of life is, what I describe as our social/relational nature. There is not one moment of our existence when we are alone; - we are always in relationship. Unlike our genetic and deterministic nature, we have to learn the skills to develop that into a mature state of personal reality.

For Al, in his time with Rowan; - caring for and nurturing her, he was a major beneficiary, along with her.

We all got to see aspects of him that brought a smile to his face, - and ours. Relationships are, in their essence, a “two-way street”. They only reach fruition when they are

It is with a heart filled with love and gratitude, although slightly broken at the moment, that I share that we said our final goodbye to my dad, Al Kubeluis, POP, on Sunday evening. Chris, Mom and I were with him as he took his final breath. For the last 2 weeks, he has been surrounded by family and loved ones. As many of you know, my dad was diagnosed with metastasized prostate cancer nearly 5 and a half years ago. This disease did not define him. Rather, it was an impediment in his daily goal to exercise, find adventure and enjoy his family. My mom was an amazing caregiver and wife managing his treatments and advocating for him. Without her, he'd not have been able to thrive as he did these last years. I'd guess that 99% of my conversations with him over these years began with him telling me he was GREAT! It really did not matter what he was going through. This was his approach to life. Switchfoot's song "Dare You to Move" makes me think of my dad, as do so many others.

My dad exercised every day of his life. He logged it, set goals and celebrated his accomplishments. He celebrated his increase in rankings as he entered new age groups. He compared times After Diagnosis to see how they improved. Retiring at age 55 after a demanding career at the Federal Reserve Board, he found joy in life on Harris Creek. Being here brought him great happiness. The water was his playground... kayaks, canoes, the Rowan Express, his Crabby boats, crabbing, fishing... As he slowed down and could no longer run, he found joy in walking, swimming, biking, boating and yoga. We can not tell you how many electric bikes he bought and then donated only to order another one. Amazon's stock must be tanking this week. I think boating and being on the water gave him the most peacefulness... even if some of those grand adventures turned our hair gray. He enjoyed this lifestyle in the summers of his childhood on Bodkin Creek and returned to it in retirement.

I do believe that his strong, athletic body enabled him to thrive as much as possible during these years. They say endurance athletes have a greater capacity to tolerate pain. I hope that is the case. I admire his courage and positive approach to life, and us, during this time. It's perhaps been the most inspirational part of my relationship with him.

I would never wish cancer or illness on anyone. However, the positive gift it gave us was the very clear knowledge that our time with him was limited. I believe that we (his family and friends) made the most of this time. We were blessed with much time. We spent a great deal of time together, trying to make every celebration, holiday, Orioles and Ravens game a little extra special. With each passing year, we knew we were on borrowed time. Yet, my dad continued to stay positive and thrive through the difficult times. I hope we carry this forward through our lives - - and I hope each of you do as well. After all, we do not know how much time we have left together here on earth and letting those people you hold dear know how important they are to you, is all that really matters. I know my dad felt our LOVE.

Thank you to all the friends and family who have called, visited and supported him over the years. It meant so much to him - and to us.

Despite our sadness, we feel LOVE and know how fortunate we are to have had this time. My mom wishes to celebrate dad's life this summer but wishes to also have a visitation next Saturday, March 9th from 2 - 4pm at Fellows Funeral Home, 200 South Harrison Street in Easton. There will be no formal presentation at the visitation. We will save that for the party this summer!
