



## Anna E. Weaver

October 27, 1929 - December 20, 2011

Anna E. (Gobel) Weaver of Grasonville died on December 20, 2011. She was 82.

Mrs. Weaver was born on October 27, 1929 in Hanau, Germany and was the daughter of the late Karl Gobel and Gertrude Peter Gobel. In 1943 she graduated from Gebeschuss High School in Hanau, Germany, then received a degree in Tailoring in 1946. On December 19, 1948 she married William B. Weaver from Elm City, North Carolina and made their home in Glen Burnie, MD. They later moved to Pasadena where she and her husband began their company, Richmond Filter and Exhaust Service. In addition to working with her husband, she worked as a lab aid at Westinghouse, until moving to North Carolina in 1978.

In 1986 Mrs. Weaver and her husband moved back to Maryland residing in Stevensville. On October 4, 1993 her husband of 45 years predeceased her. In 2001 she moved to Grasonville.

Mrs. Weaver was a member of AARP, American Legion #273 Ladies Auxiliary, Kent Island Idlers, and the Grasonville Senior Center. She enjoyed her family and baking (she made some of the best chili and is known for her black forest cake).

Mrs. Weaver is survived by two sons, Bernie L. Weaver of Stevensville, MD and Wayne J. Weaver of Gambrills, MD; two beloved daughters, Judy L. Miller of Glen Burnie, MD and Linda A. Pete of Nashville, NC; a brother Theodore Gobel of Brockobel Germany; one sister, Gertrude M. Fink of Hot Spring, AR; eight grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren. In addition to her husband, she was predeceased by her son, Raymond Weaver; and a brother, Karl J. Gobel.

A private memorial service will be held at a later date.

Anna was always so helpful and caring as a neighbor and friend. When I was very ill in 1998 she brought us delicious food and baked goods. Almost every Christmas she gave me something she had made. One year it was a beautiful pillow another year a colorful Christmas apron, etc. Anna and I shared a fondness for almond pastries and one year after visiting Germany she brought me two vials of German almond flavoring. I still have one of the vials in my cupboard.

Shortly before she moved to Grasonville she had a garage sale and I was able to buy a small wooden shelf from her. It is being used in our dining room to hold some Swedish pottery, which was my grandmother's.

Since Anna and I were both European immigrants we shared many memories of what it was like to come to the US as young women.

Anna was a wonderful gardener and she took great pride in her flowers. She taught me to use coffee grounds and tea leaves as fertilizer, and I still use leftover coffee to perk up my house plants.

This year was the first time that we did not receive a Christmas card from Anna, and now we know why.

We will miss our good neighbor Anna who has left us with such special memories.
