



Carol Lurena Raulston

April 30, 1948 - September 16, 2014

Carol L. Raulston, 66, who was a corporate and trade association public affairs professional in Washington, DC, and New York City for 40 years, died September 16, at a hospital in Easton, MD.

Ms. Raulston was born in Wheaton, MO, and grew up in Neosho. She held a Masters of Arts degree in political science from the University of Missouri as the one student per year selected from Missouri for a National Defense Act Scholarship.

She retired in 2013 as Vice President of Communications for the National Mining Association in Washington. Previously, she was with Winner & Associates in New York, where she had clients in the mining, forest products, energy, education, arts and research sectors, as well as with Native American tribes. Prior to that experience, Ms. Raulston spent more than ten years managing state and federal government affairs programs in the paper industry for the American Paper Institute in Washington, DC, as well as the International Paper Company in New York City.

Ms. Raulston is survived by a sister, Judy Warren; a niece, Laura Coutant and her family, husband, Jason, and two daughters, Katie and Addie; and a nephew, Andrew Nation, and his family, wife Shawna, and two sons, Colton and Caleb.
