October 15, 1940 - April 21, 2018

Dennis King “Papa” McCarthy of Chestertown, MD, died on Saturday, April 21, 2018, at his home. He was 77.

Born on October 15, 1940, in Dumont, NJ, he was the son of the late Dennis and Dorothy King McCarthy.

He graduated from Collingswood High School, Class of 1958, and later attended University of Pittsburgh, graduating in 1962 with an Aeronautical Engineering degree. Following graduation, he accepted a job with NASA, and worked on several significant projects to include the Hubble repair mission and COBE Satellite. Dennis also worked at Johns Hopkins as Program Director of Fuse Satellite. Dennis was head of the team that supported the scientist John Mather and George Smoot that won the Nobel Prize in Physics in 2006. At the time of his death he was working as a consultant for Hawk Institute for Space Sciences.

Dennis was a very talented artist and a Pittsburgh Steelers fan. He enjoyed playing the cello, sailing and going to Long Beach Island, where he had fond memories of summers at the beach and working at the pizza shop. He loved his family and grandchildren and was always in contact with them about what was going on in their lives. Dennis was very devoted to his wife, Joan, throughout the years.

In addition to his wife, Joan McCarthy of Swanton, VT; he is survived by five daughters, Karen Ann McCarthy and Karyn Koons of PA, Karen L. Sullivan and Lenny of Crofton, MD, Kelly L. White and Ed of Arnold, MD, Kimberly A. Lyford and Tim of Swanton, VT, and Loriann Newton and Rob of Glen Burnie, MD; a twin brother, Kevin McCarthy and Karelisa of FL; six grandchildren, Eric Bryant, Ashley Bryant, Riley White, Katie White, Reece Sullivan and Jeremy Sullivan; two great-grandchildren, Felix Bryant and Alastair Bryant; and two cats, Lilly and Mocha.

A memorial service will be held on April 26, 2018, at 11:00 am, at Fellows, Helfenbein & Newnam Funeral Home, Chestertown, MD, where relatives and friends may call one hour prior (10-11am). Interment will be private.

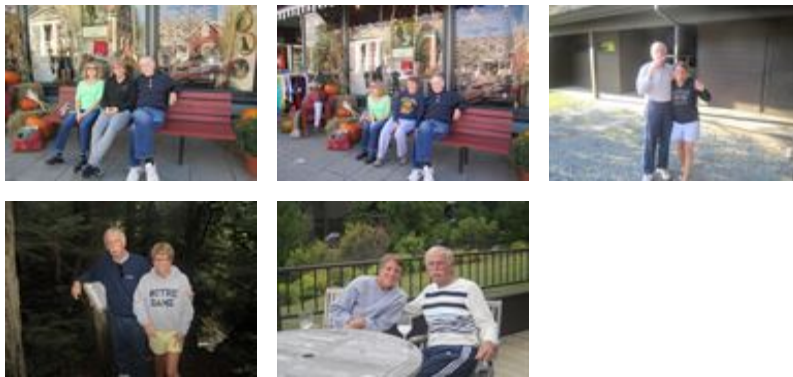
