



Harry A. McFaul

October 26, 1913 - November 12, 2012

Harry Algire (Mac) McFaul, died November 12, 2012, at the Gardens at William Hill Manor in Easton, MD. Mac, who was 99 at the time of his death, was born in Baltimore, MD, and attended Baltimore Public Schools, graduating from Baltimore City College in 1930.

In 1934, Mac graduated from Lebanon Valley College, where he was active in theater. He also played leading man in real life to his classmate, A. Charlotte Weirick, whom he began dating after dropping a pork chop on her lap in the dining hall. They married on October 7, 1938, in Washington, DC.

Mac graduated from the University of Maryland Law School in 1937. During World War II, he entered the U.S. Coast Guard as a lieutenant junior grade and served as a member of the Coast Guard's legal staff in Washington, DC. After the war, he joined the law firm of Simpson & Simpson in Rockville, MD, continuing his military service as a lieutenant commander in the Coast Guard Reserve.

In 1963, Mac and his family moved to Annapolis, MD, where they lived on the water and enjoyed many hours on their sailboat, Charter Oak. In addition to sailing, Mac and Charlotte loved to travel. During their 66 years of marriage, they visited numerous places around the world by ship, plane, car, and their Chinook recreational vehicle.

Mac was known for his quick wit, his dry sense of humor, his enthusiastic singing voice, and his devotion to his wife Charlotte, whom he lovingly cared for until her death in 2004. He will be deeply missed.

Survivors include his three daughters, Barbara Cook of Royal Oak, MD, Ellen Swierk of Hartwood, VA. and Mary Ann Bonos of Stockton, NJ; eight grandchildren; and 14 great-grandchildren.
