



Louise "Twinkie" Smith

January 20, 1917 - November 15, 2015

Louise Randolph deRosset ("Twinkie") Smith, 98, died of natural causes Nov. 15, 2015, at Heron Point, Chestertown, MD. A memorial service will be held at Emmanuel Church, 101 N. Cross Street, Chestertown, MD, on Dec. 5 at 11:00 am.

Twinkie was born in Baltimore, to Thomas C. deRosset and Ida Randolph deRosset on Jan 20, 1917. She is preceded in death by her husband of 44 years, Angelo J. Smith, Jr.; her sisters, Ida and Betty, and her daughter, Louise Smith Newlin. She is survived by her other three children, Thomas deRosset Smith, Lucy Bradley Smith, and Peyton Randolph Smith, as well as eight grandchildren; and 6 great-grandchildren.

Twinkie attended Roland Park Country Day School, Oldfields School and Bouve-Boston College. After college, she married in 1941. Shortly after WWII, her husband was employed by The DuPont Company and they lived in Wilmington, DE, where she was active in community volunteer work, served as President of the Children's Bureau and, later in politics, was appointed Delaware's Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives. At her husband's retirement they moved to Wilmington, NC, and after his death to Heron Point.

A natural athlete, she won the Delaware State Doubles Title in tennis, and her Club Championship in golf at the Cape Fear Country Club. winkie will be

remembered as short in stature but tall in commitments to family and friends. The family wishes to extend their gratitude to the staff at Heron Point for their support during her last months and weeks.
