I was a relatively new animal control officer and we had a call for 3 deer on the White House property. After chasing the last deer around for quite a while (including when she jumped off a balcony and landed on a shiny Volvo crashing in the roof) Ted managed to dart her. Once she was asleep we loaded her in the back and Pam jumped in with her while I drove like crazy out to gaithersburg where the only wildlife rehab was at the time. Once on the highway the deer started waking up. I could hear her thrashing around. Pam was yelling at me to "drive faster." When I glanced in the back Pam was laying on top of the deer trying to hold her down. I drove as fast as I could and despite the potentially quite dangerous situation we were both laughing so hard I am amazed we made it there safely. She pushed me out of my comfort zone on many occasions which has helped me with the work I do today. She helped me to become determined to help animals but also indirectly helped me to find my passion for people and animals.

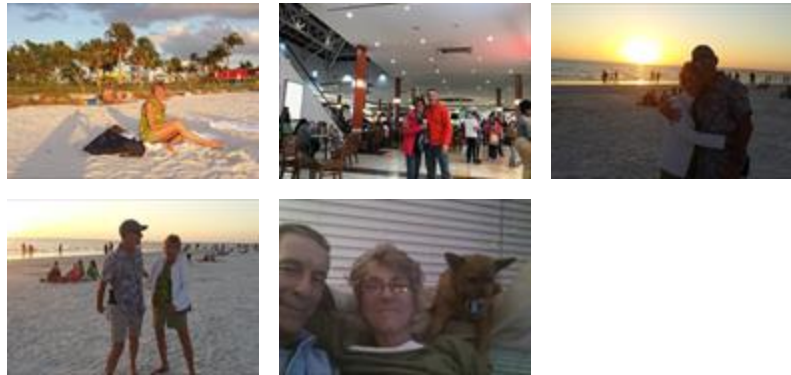

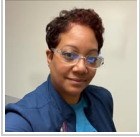

“ I had the privilege of working with Pam at the DC Animal Shelter in the 1990s. The Washington Post once ran a series about "The Worst Jobs in DC" or something to that effect, and working at the DC Animal Shelter was featured as one of them: mainly because back in those days, the shelter accepted every single animal that came to its doors, no questions asked. It was a daily deluge and Pam led a crew of rescue drivers, wildlife responders, volunteers, kennel cleaners, and telephone staff. She must have answered a new question or solved a different problem every five minutes during her ten-hour days. I am not even sure she ever got more than a day off each week. She was on call after hours. She was a walking miracle and always maintained her compassion and good humor after years of this work. When she had to release an animal from its pain or because no one wanted to adopt it, her tenderness and respect for every single animal never faltered. She was an absolute gem and I will always be grateful for having the opportunity to know her. Pam gave everything she had for those animals, and made such a difference in the lives of those of us who learned so much from her example. Rest in peace, Pam. I hope you are surrounded by sweet, furry beings who were blessed to know you, too.

“ For 17 years, I volunteered at the DC Animal Shelter on New York Ave, run by the Washington Humane Society. My main job was processing applications to adopt cats. Pam was the manager there a good part of those years. Several people have commented on how wonderful she was with the animals -- intuitive about their needs, caring for their well being, helping them move into good homes...but she was just as fantastic working with people, be they staff, volunteers or clients. Others have already said it: she was a mentor, a role model, an inspiration.

But my story is about Rusty, a scraggly, five-year-old, non-show-dog type of Cairn Terrier, who was picked up by Animal Control running loose in far NE DC, with wounds all over his neck presumably from an attack by a pack of at large dogs. (Later someone said: "If there was a fight, Rusty probably started it.") I was smitten. When he healed enough, Pam let me take him home for a few hours to see if he would devour my 3 cats --this was not a usual practice. He didn't devour because he was too busy trying to mark his territory all over the house (while on his leash). So we adopted Rusty, and he lived to the ripe of age of about 17. Thank you, Pam.
