Terrance Todd Oliver, of Stevensville, Maryland, passed away surrounded by the love of his family on June 30, 2026. Born on January 6, 1952, in Annapolis, Terry spent his life deeply rooted in the community he called home and carried a larger-than-life presence everywhere he went. Terry was the beloved husband of Linda Oliver, with whom he shared more than 50 years of marriage after the two famously married on August 29, 1975, within just three months of meeting. Together they built a life centered around family, laughter, hard work, and love.

He was a devoted father to Ryan Pfeiffer (Robbie), Jason Oliver (Jessica), and Ross Oliver (Maggie). Terry was also a proud and loving grandfather to Allison (†), Robbie (Jasmine), Thomas, Arianna, Emily, Freyja, and Anders, and great-grandfather to Merle. To his grandchildren and many others who loved him, he was affectionately known simply as “TT.” Nothing brought him more joy than spending time with his grandchildren and great-grandchild, all of whom he loved fiercely and unconditionally. Terry was preceded in death by his siblings Ed, Rocky, and Dawn, and is survived by his sisters Sherrie and Cathy. He was the son of Dorothy Humphreys and William Oliver.

A graduate of Annapolis High School, Terry spent more than 40 years working in the residential and commercial construction industries. He was known for his strong work ethic, dependable nature, and ability to build not only

structures, but lasting friendships and respect from those around him. Outside of work, Terry lived life fully. He coached youth ice hockey for the Easton Ice Hawks and Chesapeake Chiefs, guiding players from mites through midgets, and also played in the Talbot County Community Center recreational men's hockey league. Terry's passion for hockey extended beyond the ice, as he was instrumental in helping build the roller hockey rink at Batts Neck Park to encourage growth and love of the sport.

Terry also loved golfing and riding motorcycles, especially his three-wheeled CanAm Spyder. He found great joy in riding with friends and being part of the Maryland Spyder Web and Ryders on Spyders communities. One of the hardest losses Parkinson's disease brought him was having to step away from riding, something he truly loved.

Those who knew Terry will remember his sense of humor most of all. He was a natural jokester whose impromptu birthday celebrations became legendary among family and friends. He had a way of making people laugh, feel welcome, and enjoy the moment.

Terry leaves behind a legacy of laughter, love, resilience, and devotion to family. He will be deeply missed and forever remembered by all who knew and loved him.

A Celebration of Life honoring Terry will be held on Friday, August 7, 2026, from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM at The Lodge Annapolis, 177 Jennifer Rd, Annapolis, MD 21401, in The Game Room. Family and friends are invited to come share stories, memories, food, and a toast in his honor. Light appetizers will be provided and a cash bar will be available.
