“ Vickie

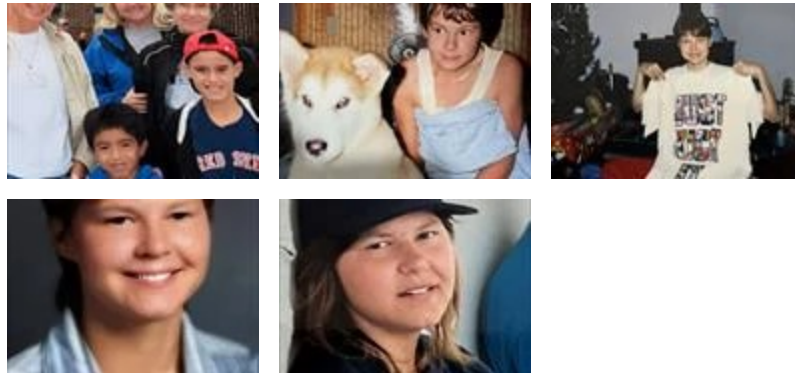
I met Vickie in the army when she was 18 years old, I was 24. She looked like she was mid teens, barely out of high school. We remained friends for the next 42 years. Over the years Vic slowly related a painful story about the time after she left her grandmother's home to live with her mother. Mom did not provide what you'd call a stable living environment. Her mom was often involved relationships with different men and that appeared to be a bigger priority than her daughter. It came to a point when Vickie asked to be placed in the foster care system. She was around 13 or 14 years old. She survived two foster homes and other short-term placements, but not without scars. Vickie made a plan. She knew as soon as she turned 17 her mother would quite willingly sign consent for her to go into the United States Army. She stuck to the plan. Vickie was a good soldier. She followed the rules. She kept her uniform pressed her boots shined and did whatever the army told her. She was what they called a squared away soldier. After the military, she began pursuing a career in cable and fiber optics. She excelled in this area and moved up the ranks pretty quickly. After a number of years in the field, Vickie left that position. She wanted to get her degree working with elementary school age kids in hospital settings. While working toward that, she began a job at Amazon. She worked there for several years, while living in Summerville, South Carolina. It was around this time that Vickie began working with the local miracle league, doing calendars and photography and working at different activities. Vickie fell in love

with the kids of The Miracle league. She was good at bringing out smiles in the children she was working with. She very much enjoyed working with the kids and their families. My boys spent many a weekend at Vickie and Maggie's at the beach. She also assisted me in coaching each of their soccer teams Vickie's final move was back to her home area. She'd always missed having family and very much wanted to be a part of her family. She headed to Maryland with only what was in her car and the promise of a new job. I'm glad to know she was able to make peace with her past and reconnect with family members.
